What's on the Website? by Mary Hamilton

Have you ever wondered why or how the KSA Board members make decisions? You'll find essential background information explaining their actions on the KSA website.

What KSA does is determined by the KSA Mission and Goals. You'll find those on the KSA website here: <http://www.kystory.org/about-KSA/mission-and-goals.shtml>. Every public KSA activity connects with the KSA Mission and Goals. For example, the Teller Wanted form, the Teller Directory, and the Event Calendar on the website help with Goal 3 "To connect listeners, tellers, and event planners by serving as a clearinghouse for storytelling information." Producing the Kentucky Storytelling Conference helps with Goal 4 "To provide instruction for people of all ages seeking to develop and improve their storytelling skills." When you receive a request from your KSA Board asking if you are available to help staff a KSA table at a conference sponsored by a different organization, you are seeing evidence of Goal 2.b "To seek on-going support, understanding, and appreciation for storytelling as a valuable component in many professions including, but not limited to, education, law, medicine, ministry, politics, and business." and Goal 5. "To work with government agencies, businesses, organizations, and other groups to find new ways to bring storytelling to the public."

On the KSA website, you'll find the overall KSA Mission Statement -- "The Kentucky Storytelling Association, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit membership organization whose mission is to develop on-going support and appreciation for storytelling in the Commonwealth." -- and six specific KSA Goals. Take a look. You might discover you have ideas you'd like to volunteer to make happen that will help KSA improve the work of fulfilling its mission and goals. Your KSA Board cannot possibly accomplish the work of KSA alone, so volunteers are always welcome.

How KSA is governed is determined by the KSA Bylaws. You'll find the current KSA Bylaws here: <http://www.kystory.org/about-KSA/BylawsAugust172013.pdf>. These bylaws are similar to those of most non-profit membership organizations. In addition, some Board actions -- think "behind the scenes" as compared with more public KSA activities -- are not specified by KSA Bylaws or guided by the KSA Mission and Goals, but are determined by regulations that set requirements for non-profits. Such information is not on the website, but is printed in Board Manuals, provided to every KSA Board member to help them meet their responsibilities to be sure KSA fulfills legal requirements and stays financially healthy. Examples of legal requirements for non-profits include registering yearly with the Kentucky Secretary of State's office, filing an IRS Form 990 electronic postcard, and registering with the Kentucky Attorney General's office because KSA conducts fund-raising activities. In addition, non-profit 501(c)(3) organizations, like KSA, are required to raise funds to show they do indeed have public support, and truth be told, without fund-raising the most important actions of KSA -- the actions that tie directly to the KSA Mission and Goals -- would simply not be possible.

Elsewhere in this KSA Newsletter, you are sure to find opportunities for you to become even more involved in KSA. Please consider them, and thank you for being a Kentucky Storytelling Association member.

2014 Conference News by Betsy Fleischer

As of March 15, we have 12 workshops submitted for 9 slots. The selection committee will have a hard job deciding on the line-up.

We have new, new, new, never been done before, for your conference this year.

For the first time ever we will be having a pre-conference six-hour workshop on Friday!!! Judy Sima will be the presenter. And also new this year we will not have one, but two featured tellers!! Judy Sima and Pam Holcomb! See the KSA website for details on our two featured tellers. And sign up now!! for the pre-conference only, the conference only, or for both.

Also new this year is an "Early Bird at last year's prices" registration. If you register by May 31, all KSA and NSN members only pay \$30 for a single, or \$75 for a family of three or more. Non-members pay \$45 for a single, or \$110 for a family of three or more.

If you register by October 7, all KSA and NSN members only pay \$40 for a single, or \$95 for a family of three or more. Non-members pay \$60 for a single, or \$135 for a family of three or more. If you register after October 7 or at the door, everyone pays \$80 for a single, or \$175 for a family of three or more.

Storytellers for this inaugural event will be KSA Members Don Creacy and Pam Holcomb, Ohio-based storyteller Stephen Hollen, and Indiana-based storyteller "Jack's Mama" Sharon Kirk Clifton. All four certainly know how to spin a compelling tale, so there's sure to be plenty of entertainment throughout the weekend.

The Kentucky Youth Storytelling committee and other members of the KSA board have been hard at work this quarter to market the KYS competition.

The Kentucky Youth Storytelling committee designed a KYS flyer for the website and helped other members of the PR and KYS committees write a blurb to send to radio stations, use as a Facebook, or other social media, status, or as an e-mail to teachers. The use of the flyer and blurb are limited only by the user's imagination. So feel free to be creative. KSA President, Donna Slaton, emailed several teachers and librarians in western KY with the offer to make a presentation in their classroom about KYS or send them information they can give to students. With this winter's relentless weather it has been hard to communicate with teachers or schools. During her time telling stories to a Girl Scout troop in Feb, Donna gave them each a flyer. Donna will be handing out KYS information along with KSA cards at Hanson Village Arts Festival March 29, an all day event.

President elect, Mary Hamilton, sent KYS information to every University of Kentucky hosted, education-based listserv including those for Kentucky's school librarians, family resource & youth service centers, elementary teachers, arts & humanities teachers, middle & high school literacy programs, drama teachers, English teachers, and literacy project participants. She also sent information to people from her personal e-mail contact list who have connections with schools or with children ages 8 – 17, to any teachers and librarians she has worked with, and any folks she knows with children or grandchildren of the appropriate age, and she asked all of them to help spread the word.

Board Member, Jerry Young called in to an open topic radio talk show hosted by Scott Johnson on WVLK AM. The station recorded a short infomercial that he has heard them broadcast. He has also given flyers to Boy and Girl Scouts in Lexington. He has mailed flyers to youth ministers and friends who home school their children.

KYS Chair, Gwenda Johnson, sent the blurb to all County Extension Agents in Kentucky, to all school teachers in her home county, and posted it as her Facebook status. She is also going into classrooms during March and April to talk about KYS.

This year's torchbearer, Noah Hughes enjoyed his participation in the National Youth Storytelling Showcase in Utah. Pam Holcomb, who has worked with Noah throughout his youth storytelling involvement said, "I'm super proud of our 2 time National Youth storyteller, Noah Hughes. Noah plans to use storytelling in the future. He's going to attend Morehead University and major in broadcasting. Noah is a senior at Harlan County High School."

Inspiration: My grandkids are undergoing vision loss and other life-threatening issues because of a rare genetic blood disorder. For a while, we assumed it was only the older that has been getting treatment since age 4, but now we have discovered it is also his younger sister. This has been going on for some time, but now they are both undergoing chemo and bone marrow transplant, at Children's Hospital in Cincinnati. There they see children from all over the world with severe health issues and some not getting well. The Ronald McDonald House across the street is fabulous place after the long hospital stay. So our whole family has become tuned in to a different population that we are now part of.

Having enjoyed my storytelling at Cassidy Elementary for years, they said, "These kids need your stories, Poppy!"

I said, "There is a way to reach lotsa children" (like Carolyn Franzini does at Cave Run and what happens at Jonesboro, been there four times since 1980). "We could have a **STORYTELLING FESTIVAL**. Furthermore, I know lotsa very good storytellers".

'Wow!' they said, "**Let's have a party!**"

So we are going to have a storytelling party. Lexington Spellbinders have given the idea an enthusiastic response. My Blind Veterans Chapter wants to endorse and help sponsor it. Maybe you know another organization which would get on board?

So now, for the next three weeks, we are enlisting a steering committee of persons who want to make this happen. We will probably do all of this online. And by end of April be selecting tasks.

Will you help? Lots of special needs children can catch new dreams through storytelling. Who will pitch in to lend a hand?

An invitation from Paschal Baute

One out of 20 children is born handicapped. One out of 8, 15%, has some special need, handicap, adversity, trauma, or loss that slows learning and growing. I was one of these "lost kids" until one teacher changed my life, at age 13, by believing in me. More than other children these kids need to find hope and inspiration to cope with adversity. If we can save one child from despair, this project is worthwhile.

Stories and storytelling foster hope, dreams, and possibilities like the famous Ugly Duckling. We dream of a storytelling festival designed for special needs children. Will you help? 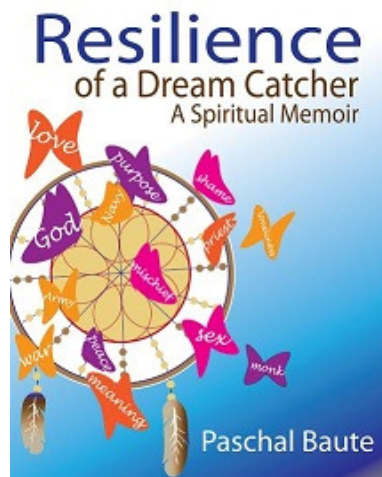
