Founding Board Member Dies

Gaylord Cooper, a founding Board member of the Kentucky Storytelling Association passed away on May 5, 2014. Gaylord steadfastly helped bring about our organization beginning with the April 2004 early conversations about the possibility of a statewide storytelling organization. When an interim Board was needed, he was one of five people who volunteered. These five folks met frequently working to help bring KSA into being. Their tasks included: polling other interested folks to decide a name, filing Articles of Incorporation, writing and adopting KSA bylaws, adopting a logo, successfully applying to the IRS for 501(c)3 tax-exempt status, planning and conducting the first Kentucky Storytelling Conference in Bardstown in October 2004, leading KSA through its first year with members, and then planning and conducting the second Kentucky Storytelling Conference at Greenbo Lake State Resort Park, near Greenup, Kentucky in 2005. Through all that initial work, coupled with imagining and dreaming what KSA might become, Gaylord was there working with other founders to make KSA a reality. He was a man of strong opinions who also asked good questions of his fellow volunteer board members helping us all stay focused on bringing KSA into being.

His interests in storytelling focused primarily on history and genealogy. In his local area he promoted the covered bridges, spoke to various groups, and wrote articles on regional history and genealogy. He also offered two talks, "Kentucky Mountain Superstitions: Origins and Uses" and "Kentucky Mountain Language - It Ain't Hillbilly" through the Kentucky Humanities Council Speakers Bureau. Eventually his interest in genealogy overtook his interest in storytelling, and he lost touch with KSA.

Gaylord, a retired Machine Operator for Norfolk and Southern Railroad and a U.S. Army Vietnam War Veteran, died at age 68. He is survived by his wife Laura Burnett Cooper of South Shore, Kentucky. He was buried at Kentucky Veterans Cemetery North East in Grayson, Kentucky.

Kentucky Storytelling Month Now Official by Mary Hamilton

In the last KSA newsletter, we told you a proclamation was expected from Governor Beshear's office in response to KSA's request that September 2015 be declared Kentucky Storytelling Month. The proclamation has arrived! Below is a press release for you to share with everyone you know to encourage them to participate in Kentucky Storytelling Month during September 2015:

Governor Stephen Beshear has proclaimed September 2015 as Storytelling Month in Kentucky. Mark your calendars now and start planning. Storytelling Month focuses programming statewide -- at schools, libraries, parks and community events -- to emphasize Kentucky's rich heritage of stories and tellers. From grandparents to youth tellers and from professionals to amateurs, tellers abound in your community.

What is storytelling? It's an interactive art form. Tellers relate a narrative, while closely observing listeners whose reactions guide the teller. For example, the hunter-to-hunter retelling of a hunt is not likely to be told with the same wording as the hunter-to-grandma retelling of the same hunt, even though the hunter is telling the same story to both listeners!

To celebrate Kentucky storytelling in 2014, teens in Paducah told stories to elementary students, Paul Sawyer Public Library conducted a Liar's Contest, schools and public libraries held storytelling festivals in Elliott, Grayson and Kenton Counties, and Trimble County Apple Festival events included storytelling.

WHEREAS, Storytelling can be used as an educational tool in any discipline for any age; and





The Tailor

(a folktale for retelling retold by Mary Hamilton, with telling comments in italics)

A long time ago, there lived a tailor. Oh, he was a wonderful tailor. Everyone he knew paid him to sew their coats, their jackets, their pants -- whatever they needed, he could sew it. He was so busy he rarely had time enough to sew anything for himself. He dreamed of sewing himself a fine coat. He found the cloth he wanted for his coat, so he set that fabric aside in hopes that someday he would have time enough to make himself a coat.

At last that day arrived. The tailor spread the fabric out on his cutting board, and soon he was sewing a wonderful coat. When it was finished, the tailor put on his new coat. Oh, he loved his new coat. In fact he loved his coat so much, *(I usually sing the first two lines of the chorus and chant the last one. I also repeat the entire chorus immediately the first time I use it so the audience learns it and can easily join in on later repetitions. Of course, it could also be chanted, not sung, so please -- please yourself if you retell the tale.)*

Chorus: He wore it here; he wore it there

He wore it, wore it everywhere, until it was all worn out.

At least, he thought it was all worn out.

But when he spread his worn out coat on his cutting board, he discovered he had just enough material left to make a jacket. Oh, he sewed a wonderful jacket. He put his new jacket on. He loved his new jacket. In fact, he loved his new jacket so much,

But when he spread his worn out jacket on his cutting board, he discovered he had just enough good material left to make a vest. He sewed a wonderful vest. He put his new vest on. He loved his new vest. In fact, he loved his new vest so much,

Chorus

But when he spread his worn out vest on his cutting board, he discovered he had just enough good material left to make a hat. He sewed a wonderful hat. He put that hat on. He loved his new hat. In fact, he loved his new hat so much,

Chorus

But when he spread his worn out hat on his cutting board, he discovered he had just enough good material left to make a button, a cloth-covered button. He made a wonderful button. He fastened that button to his shirt. He loved his new button. In fact he loved his new button so much,

Chorus

And indeed it was true, that button was so worn out, he couldn't sew anything else to wear, but he did still have enough good material left to create a story -- that's right, a story -- the story of his coat, that became his jacket, that became his vest, that became his hat, that became his button -- that became this story I have just told to you.

This popular folktale can be found in at least three different picture book retellings:

Gilman, Phoebe, [Something from Nothing](http://phoebegilman.com/something.html). Scholastic Canada, 1992. *On this site <http://phoebegilman.com/something.html> you can read the author's behind the scenes story about some of her decisions in writing and illustrating this picture book, and you'll find a teachers' section that includes a few ideas for classroom extension activities based on this book. There are really two stories here because fabric scraps that fall through the wooden floor board of a house keep being reused by a mouse family who lives below the people. Because no narration is written for the activities of the mouse family, children can use their own words to tell each other the story of what is happening to the mouse family. If the children work in pairs, they can easily trade off on being the storyteller with each new turn of the page.*

Sanfield, Steve, Bit by Bit, New York: Philomel Books, 1995. *The cover of this version, illustrated by Susan Gaber, shows a person sitting in a chair holding this book, and the cover of the book being held shows the same person sitting in a chair holding the same book, and so on, smaller and smaller.*

Tabak, Simms. Joseph Had a Little Overcoat. New York: Viking, 1999. *Tabak won the Caldecott Medal, the highest award for picture book illustration presented yearly by the American Library Association, for this book. Holes in the pages play a fun role in showing just what was created with each reuse of the material.*

I no longer recall when, or from whom, I first encountered this story but I have heard it many times, told in a variety of different ways, but always with new items being created from old. Most print versions attribute it to a Jewish folksong, and the Simms Tabak version even includes notation for the song.

In school residency work, I have used the story as a pattern for children to use to create their own original recycle/reuse tales. I learned that children of a wide variety of skill could build new stories using this pattern. In a special education, self-contained, classroom a number of years ago, students quite successfully created tales – one that began with a deer hunt and ended up with a worn out wallet and another that began with a barn beset by tornados until eventually all that was left was a mailbox post. Because it has been retold and illustrated in three quite different styles, the picture books also lend themselves well to projects in which students compare and contrast the choices made by the writers and illustrators.

My retelling is intentionally highly repetitive. I want my audience to be able to gradually join in more and more, and indeed they do as the story moves along. Primary level students are my typical audience for the tale.
